Leadership in 2021

Chief Edward Delmore

Delmore entered law enforcement in 1979 as a police dispatcher in a suburb of St. Louis. In 1982 he became a police officer in south-western Illinois where he served as a patrol officer, undercover narcotics investigator, major case squad investigator, patrol sergeant, watch commander, criminal interdiction unit commander, deputy chief of police, and chief of police.

In 2010, following a nation-wide recruitment, Delmore began leading the Gulf Shores Police Department.

He earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Western Illinois University and a Master of Arts Degree from Webster University in St. Louis, Missouri. He is a graduate of the Administrative Officer's course at the University of Louisville's Southern Police Institute and of the FBI National Academy.

Delmore has instructed thousands of officers throughout the United States in leadership, interviewing techniques, body language, criminal apprehension techniques, and officer safety.

He is a private pilot and certified scuba diver, rescue diver and public safety diver.

He and his wife, Ann, have three grown children and one granddaughter. Ann is retired veteran police officer with more 22 years of service. Their daughter, Alyssa, is a Police Officer in Foley, and their son, Ryan, is a Deputy Sheriff in Baldwin County.

On the other hand, some officer involved shootings, in-custody deaths, pursuit related fatalities, etc., can be prevented. In this program Chief Delmore will provide the history of law enforcement tactics for a number of high-risk incidents and will also provide the evolution of those tactics arriving at today's "best practices." Extensive video examples will be used.

Chief Delmore will also provide updated case law that law enforcement administrators must insure their personnel know, understand and can articulate.

He will provide instruction in the use of objectively reasonable and constitutionally sound techniques that administrators in-turn should insure that their subordinates are trained in regarding conducting proactive policing – as opposed to racial profiling.

Recruitment and retention of officers has become a significant problem for most law enforcement agencies in the United States. Effective recruitment and retention technique recommendations will be provided.
